Scouts Searching for Area Businesses Who Need Flags Replaced by Lindsay Foster

On Aug. 4, local area Cub Scouts (Pack 151, Pack 319, Pack 351, and Pack 435) and Girl Scouts (Troop 2702 and Troop 2711) will be searching the Saginaw area for flags and they need the community's help.

Based on observations of various United States flags that appeared to be in poor condition, the Scouts were inspired to offer replacement flags to local area businesses and organizations.

Scouts will collect tattered and torn flags that should no longer be flown and will provide a new flag (donated by the VFW Post 13074) to local businesses. Scouts will be out between 6:30 and 8 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 4 and will be collecting unserviceable flags and offering replacements.

Flags will later be destroyed in accordance with the U.S. Flag Code, Title 4, Chapter 1, Section 8, paragraph (k), which states "The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning."

Providing the replacement flags is one requirement for the United States Heritage Award. The United States Heritage Award was designed to give youth recognition for learning about the heritage of the United States of America and being involved. The program is designed to promote greater understanding of historical documents, civic duty and cultural pride in our nation.
